Applewood: The Charles Stewart Mott Estate, 1400 E. Kearsley Street, Flint 48503 • ruthmottfoundation.org

(Open 11:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., Thursday-Sunday) Charles Stewart Mott Estate was home to C.S. and Ruth Mott. The gardens and exhibits are open for self-exploration throughout the day. Free house tours are by reservation only, details available online; Guided garden tour at Noon, no reservations required.

The Capitol Theatre, located in downtown Flint's entertainment district, is a cinema and concert venue. The theatre opened in 1928 and was listed on the National Register of Historic Places in Michigan in 1985. Current show – Whitey Morgan with Alex Williams: Saturday, August 24 at 8:00 p.m.

Durant-Dort Factory One, 303 W. Water Street, Flint 48503 • gmfactoryone.com

Originally established in 1886 as the Flint Road Cart Co., this historic Flint GM plant, referred to as the American automaker's birthplace and epicenter of the global auto industry, is open for business after four years of restorations. Factory One includes a conference and event space, along with the GM carriage-building/vehicle-manufacturing archive collection containing about 100,000 historical documents, photos and other artifacts related to Flint's GM history.
